


Ascension & Pentecost (Acts 1-2)




"And when he had said these things ... he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight." Acts 1.9

Ascension & Pentecost (Acts 1-2)

- The Holy Spirit comes on Pentecost
- The Holy Spirit comes "like a mighty rushing wind" with "tongues as of fire"
- All were amazed and perplexed: "What does this mean?"





The Ascension & Pentecost accounts demonstrate that the Holy Spirit is the power that enables the church.

Stoning of Stephen (Acts 6-7)

- Stephen's indicting speech against the Sanhedrin:
 - God does not dwell in "houses made by hands."
 - × You persecuted the prophets
 - × You have killed the Messiah
 - × You have resisted the Holy Spirit
 - × You have failed to keep the Torah
- The enraged Sanhedrin responds by rushing out and stoning Stephen.

Stoning of Stephen (Acts 6-7)


- The scene of Stephen's execution:
 - "full of the Holy Spirit"
 - o "I see... the Son of Man"
 - o "receive my spirit"
 - o "do not hold this sin against them"


Stephen's execution demonstrates that, through the Holy Spirit, converts do as Jesus did.



Conversion of Paul (Acts 9)

- Saul's first cameo appearance is at the stoning of Stephen
- Saul persecutes the church
- A voice says: "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"
- Ananias reluctantly follows the Lord's instructions





Conversion of Cornelius (Acts 10)

- Cornelius the "God-fearing" Centurion at Caesarea
- Through the Spirit, Cornelius & Peter meet
- Peter preaches; the Spirit descends like Pentecost

Conversions of Paul & Cornelius (Acts 9-10)

The conversions of Paul & Cornelius foreshadow the mission to the Gentiles and the transformation of Christianity from a movement within Judaism to an independent, universal faith.
